From The Fire Chief:

Fortunately, the 2023 fire season was much quieter than 2022. On the heels of The Crooks Fire last year, we had no wildfires in our service area during the 2023 fire season.

Last fall's newsletter was devoted to our efforts to raise funds for Engine 83. We took delivery of the new truck last spring. Compared to some of our older vehicles, Engine 83 practically pumps itself. We've been thrilled with it so far. One secondary benefit we thought would come from the truck was that it would attract new recruits. Whether it was the new truck or not, the last year has been our best year for recruiting new firefighters in the 20 years I've been with the department. We've had ten new firefighters join and get certified (the jargon is *red carded*) as wildland firefighters for the first time or recertify through Walker Fire with several other new recruits in the process to also get their red cards.



We wanted to reiterate the message from the last few fall newsletters regarding winter preparedness. Related to structure fires, please get your chimney swept, leave interior doors closed because that limits a fire's ability to move through your house, make sure smoke detectors work or if they are more than ten years old they should be replaced and make sure everyone knows where your fire extinguisher is. When we respond to a call for a structure fire, we do a quick assessment of the situation that has several steps including turning off the electricity and the propane. You could change the outcome for the better by turning off the electricity and propane BUT ONLY IF IT IS SAFE TO DO SO.

Also, we would request that you do all you can to get your road/driveway plowed after any snowstorms as well as make use of the cinders left by the county in various places in our area including behind the firehouse. The community Facebook pages are great resources to see who might be available for snow removal. The Fire Department cannot set the expectation of being able to drive through a foot or two of unplowed snow in trying to get to your house. We'd get out and walk if we had to but marching for a half mile in a foot of snow would take a while.

When the snow starts and begins to accumulate, the roads become surprisingly treacherous. Please drive slower than you think you need to and please consider chains for your tires. Also, be on the lookout for people coming up from town or even Phoenix to play in the snow. These sorts of visitors have been the cause of many winter accidents in our area.

One last suggestion is to have crampons or some other type of cleat to put on your shoes. When snow has been driven on here and gets compacted it is very easy to slip and fall. That sort of ground level fall can be very serious.

From The President:

Welcome to the fall 2023 newsletter for the WFPA. What a year! Last year we were flooded this year we can't get a thimble full of water even if we ask for it.

But as always, our community continues to show its true colors by helping us buy a half million-dollar fire truck. We've held fundraisers in the past which at the time seemed large. Those efforts were nothing like your generosity this year. That truck does so much for our community, thank you again.



We will be doing some cleaning projects, like clearing out some of the old stuff in these cupboards that hasn't been seen for several years. We've found some interesting things of course. One of the things they found was the original signed letter of the first president of the WFPA resigning because of health reasons. That was Robert Potter, my grandfather. (The original incorporation papers for the WFPA were filed on September 11, 1967).

The WFPA was incorporated as a purely communal all volunteer effort. We are still alive today with that Philosophy.

After renting for a year, my grandparents had purchased the Stuckey place which is the Pine Mountain north mining claim in 1947. My grandfather was nervous about fire and he put a 250 gallon tank on the back of the 1948 Willys pick-up truck that's still on the property with a gas powered pump and a 2" red hose line on a reel. Other neighbors who liked the setup, got together, and the idea of the Walker Fire Protection Association was formed.

We will figure out a way to get this kind of historical information on the website. All of you can help with that.

Walker was and remains a close community. You still find that communal effort is alive and well. Neighbors helping neighbors, social gatherings, and a group effort to keep the WFPA going.

The new truck is an example of that. Roger has done an amazing job improving our fleet and recruiting and maintaining a professional volunteer force. We are the envy of small fire departments, even some who depend on government money. Your board works hard for you, making sure we spend your money wisely and have a business-like atmosphere open to everybody. Having said all that, don't quit volunteering, we can always use help.

If you'd like to help with pancake day. Let us know. You can just show up if you want, we'll put you to work. It does help us if we know who's coming. Same with bingo. Certainly with Walker day and firefighter appreciation day can always use extra hands.

From The Vice President:

Hello to all the Walker and surrounding area residents. First, I would like to send a heartfelt "welcome" to all of the new residents and there are quite a few of you this year! As we close out 2023 I want to say how very nice it was this year getting to see many of you at local events at the Fire Station. These events are fun and help to support the local fire association financially. If you have not been to any of our events, I encourage you to come to a few as it is a great way to meet other people in the community and have a lot of fun. In this newsletter you will find the 2024 WFPA Calendar of Events on page 9 - this is a great page to hang on the fridge so you know what is coming up at the station.



One of the main things we do as a Board is look for ways to improve our overall systems and functions. One recent improvement was upgrading the water supply equipment so responding crews can fill the water tenders quicker. This improves efficiency in saving time at the tender and also scene responses. Another item the Board is always looking for improvement with is our ISO rating. This ISO rating helps everyone in being able to obtain insurance coverage for their property. We ask what do we need to change? How can we invest in equipment, education or training for our volunteers to serve the community even better? It is something that we strive to always be improving upon!

That spirit of improving extends to all of our community as well not just the WFPA Board. We should ALL look to find ways we can help improve our community and ways to help each other out. One idea that came to mind: helping one another with things like property cleaning and clearing when it comes to driveways and roads which are many times overlooked when we talk about fire wise and safety. Take a walk or even better a drive with a larger truck down your driveway and your road (especially those that are private roads) and give it a good once over thinking to yourself is it clear? Are there things or obstacles? Could Walker Fire or other agencies equipment access my road/driveway? With my job as a Realtor I get to travel all over the area every day. I see areas where privately maintained roads are well kept while there are other areas I struggle to get to in my Tacoma and I think to myself "how would WFPA/responding agency get an ambulance or one of the fire trucks here?" I understand how some people don't want to improve their roads because they believe it cuts down on overall traffic from car/truck/UTV's but I see response accessibility as priority over all else. It is important to make sure that if you need emergency response or your neighbor needs it and you share a road/driveway that those vehicles can get to your property. The last thing anyone wants is to need help but they haven't made their properties accessible for larger trucks and equipment.

Education is key to knowing how and what to do living in the mountains. If you are new you may start noticing the term Fire Wise and wonder what does that mean. Fire Wise is about lowering wildfire risk using strategies like creating defensible space. Their direct wording is: "Defensible space is the buffer you create between a building on your property and the grass, trees, shrubs, or any wildland area that surround it. This space is needed to slow or stop the spread of wildfire and it helps protect your home from catching fire—either from embers, direct flame contact or radiant heat. Proper defensible space also provides firefighters a safe area to work in, to defend your home." (www.readyforwildfire.org) I would encourage new residents and long time ones too to use this website as a great educational resource for information, videos and more.

My thanks for your support this year and I look forward to 2024.

Pancake Breakfast is one of the greatest ways to meet and connect with your neighbors. A delicious breakfast is provided including pancakes, bacon, sausage, fruit and coffee, tea, juice. There is no charge for the breakfast, but donations are always appreciated and all proceeds go to the WFPA. Walker Merchandise is sold at each pancake breakfast as well.... Shirts, hoodies, hats, kids shirts and kid craft items, knives, miscellaneous home items, stickers. This monthly event is a big turn out every time and it happens come rain or shine. Residents, family, friends and visitors are welcome!

Bingo Nights are another way to meet neighbors, enjoy some good laughs and heckling the callers. This is a potluck event. Bring your good luck charms and a dish to share, buy as many cards as you want to play. The monies raised go towards WFPA with half of the money raised going to the cash prizes offered per game to the winners in each round. Cost Example – buy 3 cards / \$10, and you play for that all night long. We are always grateful that many of the winners donate back their prize money to the WFPA funds. Walker Day – this is our biggest and best fundraiser day every year. Held on June 15th with a rummage / garage sale starting that morning. Walker Trash Collection Services:

The subscription runs January to December for the 12 months. Six-month subscriptions and month to month subscriptions are available. The rates are \$200.00 for 12 months for the calendar year, \$150.00 for 6 months or \$50.00 for a month. We change the lock combination January 01st.

We operate this service for your convenience and to avoid people burning their garbage, especially during the dry months.

One of the problems we had last year was that home owners were sharing the lock combination short term renters, cleaning companies and contractors. All short-term rental properties are to purchase a subscription for the full term of use. The responsibility for the disposal of the trash from short term rentals is the responsibility of the rental manager. We will also be contacting the rental management companies to make sure they are aware of this.

We have new and improved video surveillance surrounding the dumpster area to help monitor activities.

If the dumpsters are full, please don't leave yours on the ground.

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




Market Statistics: 2022-2023




Total Residential Sales




Residential Median Sold Price




Residential Price Per Sq Ft



Residential Median Days on Market




Total Vacant Land Sales
